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

Enjoy Your Open Spaces

The properties in this book belong to the Town of Brookfield, the Brookfield Open Space Legacy and the Weantinoge Heritage Land Trust, Inc. and are open to the public free of charge. The following rules apply to all of Brookfield's open spaces:

- Open from Dawn until Dusk
- All dogs must be leashed and cleaned up after.
- No motorized vehicles are allowed (except farming equipment with approval of Parks & Recreation & Conservation Commission)

What does the Brookfield Conservation Commission do?





Presently, Brookfield has 1,300 acres of open space including private land trusts.

The Brookfield Conservation
Commission was formed in the
late 1960's in order to oversee the
acquisition and inventory of townowned open space. Throughout 19702005 an increasing number of parcels
were purchased. Presently, Brookfield
has 1,300 acres of open space including
private land trusts. Previously, the duties
have been primarily to inventory open
space, advise the Planning Commission
on any subdivisions, and oversee the
open spaces in Brookfield with the help
of the Parks and Recreation Department
and the Public Works Department.

The duties of the Conservation Commission have increased over the past 10 years with the acquisition of additional space as well as leasing four homes on open space. Some other duties include updating our



Brookfield Trail Guide, working with the Connecticut Historic Preservation Office to improve the Gurski Homestead property, maintenance of wooded areas, haying of field areas, wildlife management, signage and kiosks in open spaces and forestry and trail management. We also coordinate volunteer efforts for work on open spaces, plan events for Arbor Day, Earth Day and the Brookfield Farmfest all to bring awareness and an understanding of the importance of our open spaces.

We also seek grants for the purchase of additional open spaces when they become available. Conservation has received grants from the Meserve Foundation, Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection, Iroquois Gas Transmission Company, free property evaluations from the USDA

Cooperative Extension Unit and a grant for a structural engineering evaluation through the Connecticut Department of Economic & Community Development.

We often have events, such as Farmfest, and volunteer days when we plant trees, clear trails, build bluebird houses, head trail walks, etc., and we can always use volunteers! We work each year in conjunction with the Arbor Day Foundation.

Brook cuts across the northwest corner of the property. The brook flows through a wooded wetland with White Ash, Elm, and Red Maple trees around it. The grassland fields are a nesting site of Bobolinks and other ground nesting birds. A careful mowing schedule is used to protect the eggs and chicks. The trails will

lead you through the site.

Burr Farm Protected Open Space

of Brookfield from the family of Lawrence and Helen Burr in 1999. It comprises 116 acres divided into East and West parcels, along the now unused eastern end of Lake George Road, which used to connect with Pond Brook Road in Newtown. Upon the death of Helen Burr in 1997, the land was sold to the Town of Brookfield so it could be saved from development and enjoyed by the likes of hikers, naturalists, horseback riders, cross country skiers, bird watchers, and more. The West Parcel can be accessed by way of the Meadowland Trail, on a 1.1 mile hike around the perimeter of the Upper Meadow. The fields you pass were used to grow corn and hay. The East Parcel

can be hiked on the 1.4 mile, blueblazed Dingle Brook Loop Trail, which proceeds East down Dingle Brook Road, and a short distance North or South down Lake George Road.

Happy Landings Protected Open Space



Happy Landings is located at 55 Whisconier Road (Route 133) in Brookfield, CT. It was purchased as open space by the Town of Brookfield from the Gereg family in 1999. These fields and windmills have become a remaining symbol of Brookfield's rural character. The 84 acre property has a combination of rich soils, aquifer watershed with varied grasses, wetlands and hardwood forest. In order to maintain the beauty of the property, the fields are hayed each year by a farmer and trails are maintained by Brookfield Parks & Recreation.










The northern section of the trail begins near the Four Corners area of Brookfield. The trail proceeds south, within the Route 202 right-of-way, for approximately a third of a mile before crossing the Still River and proceeding along the Brookfield Municipal Center. The southern section of the trail proceeds further south through Arthur Harris Park to the vicinity of Route 133 with a total trail length of almost two miles. The Greenway can also be accessed from Brookfield Town Hall and Kid's Kingdom by a trail just south of Kid's Kingdom.



Williams-Gurski Open Space

Williams Park Open Space is located on 200 acres in the heart of Brookfield. The property features woodlands, streams, wetlands and hay fields. The main entrance, on Rt. 25 across from the town library, is on the eastern side of the property. Trails from here lead to the town's clay tennis courts, the hay fields and the wooded hill top. To the north, the property borders Brookfield High School. The northeast side features Merwin Brook and numerous large boulders. To the south is the Merwin Brook Cemetery, Gurski Homestead with its barn and forge and the Community Gardens. Parking is available at the main entrance and at the Gurski Homestead on Rt. 133.


The Blue Loop trail (1 mile long) winds around the wooded hilltop and the edge of the fields and the Red Loop trail (3 miles long) explores all of the park's features. All of the bridges and boardwalks throughout the park were built as Eagle projects by the town's Boy Scout Troops.







8 NABBY ROAD




The Town of Brookfield bought this 20.2 acre parcel from the Estate of Ken and Gert Eriksen in 2009. A colonial farm house and two barns are part of the property which adjoins Huckleberry Hill School on the north side. A giving garden is located on the property. There is a flat, mowed walking trail about one third mile long. The north half of the property is wooded with wetlands. The house and barns are presently rented and not for public use. Eriksen Farm is located on Nabby Road just off Candlewood Lake Road.

Old Bridge Sanctuary is a 25.3 acre park that was deeded to the town of Brookfield in 1965 by CL&P. Several bird species including black-capped chickadees, the tufted titmouse, and the house finch can be seen here, as well as, the downy woodpecker.




View of Lake Lillinonah

Whisconier Middle School is attended by students in grades five through eight. The front of the school has a soccer field and additional fields are located behind the school.







BOSLI Properties

THE BROOKFIELD OPEN SPACE LEGACY, INC.

(BOSLI) is a private, all volunteer, non-profit land trust based in Brookfield, Connecticut. Founded in 1965, BOSLI's mission is to maintain and manage the properties entrusted in a responsible manner, sustain a healthy wildlife habitat and conserve our natural resources, and provide safe public access to open space for passive recreation. BOSLI currently manages over 180 acres of preserved properties throughout Brookfield. The preserves with trails include The Kahlo Trail, Birch Rocks Sanctuary, Hop Brook Sanctuary, and the Loeb Preserve. Visit BOSLI at www.BOSLI.org.






LOEB SANCTUARY rises to an elevation of almost 500 feet offering vista views. Loeb is adjacent Bloom Preserve owned by the Newtown Forest Association (NFA). BOSLI and NFA are working together to provide better access to Loeb by linking our trails. Loeb is best accessed from the Tower Road entrance to Bloom Preserve and following the trail that leads up to an 18 acre open hillside meadow where you have a 30-mile view to the south and west. Periodic mowing maintains the meadow, reduces invasive vegetation, and provides grassland species such as bobolinks with an ideal environment. Atop the meadow are bluebird and tree swallow nest box trails.

HOP BROOK SANCTUARY is a

42 acre wildlife refuge for wetland flora and fauna. The wetland sanctuary is home for many species of wild birds. Visitors can observe the inhabitants of this unique ecosystem up close. Access to the sanctuary is from the cul-de-sac at the end of High Acres Road and from Long Meadow Hill Road between house addresses 124 and 128. A newly cleared trail leads from the cul-de-sac to a boardwalk that connects to the opposite side and exits on Long Meadow Hill Road. Parking is available on High Acres Road but not along Long Meadow Hill Road. Note that the boardwalk is temporarily closed — we are raising the funds needed to repair/ replace the boardwalk.

Birch Rocks Sanctuary

OBTUSE ROAD NORTH







Birch Rocks Sanctuary is a 101 acre preserve of mixed hardwood and hemlock forest. The half-mile yellow trail is a walker's trail that slopes gently down to the shore of Lake Lillinonah. The red trail branches off the yellow trail and is more rugged forming a one mile loop that leads to an ancient, protected oak tree and connects back to the yellow trail by Lake Lillinonah.



Birch Rocks neighbors Pratt Glen Preserve, a 74 acre refuge owned by the Weantinoge Heritage Land Trust. A three mile trail branches off the yellow trail in Birch Rocks and loops through Pratt Glen's blue trial, then rejoins the Birch Rocks yellow trail along Lake Lillinonah. A parking area with a trail that leads directly to the three mile loop is located on Obtuse Road North.

Kahlo Trail

The Kahlo Trail is a .5 mile loop that begins and ends on Hop Brook Road and follows the Hop Brook along its western bank. A beautifully constructed footbridge crosses the brook, thanks to the Boy Scouts. With its small waterfalls and calm pools the Kahlo Trail is a perfect place for a peaceful and relaxing walk. The entrance to the Kahlo Trail is on Hop

Brook Road between house addresses 6 and 12. Look for the short, above ground utility post. Cars can park on the street or on the shoulder between the row of large rocks and the utility post.
