

Message from your First Selectman

Town Budget Update

The Board of Selectmen voted unanimously on April 6 about Gov. Lamont's Executive Order 7I, paragraph 13, which prohibits annual town meeting and referenda for budget adoption. The order directs Selectmen to authorize and direct the Board of Finance to formulate and adopt the town budget for fiscal year 2020 - 21. And in accordance with Executive Order 7C, Selectmen authorized and directed the finance board to adopt the budget on or before June 4, 2020, then set the mill rate.

The finance board plans to meet every Wednesday at 7 p.m. for the next few weeks to discuss the town budget following the Board of Selectmen mandate in accordance with the governor's executive order. Call-in information and Zoom dial-in for participation will be provided on the town website.

I want to clear up some confusion about the Governor's Executive Order, which **mandates** the Board of Finance to adopt a budget and set a mill rate. We have no option. Ideally, both boards prefer a traditional town meeting and referendum, but the executive order specifically directs us to set a budget and mill rate for next year by June 4, 2020.

CodeRed Resident Notification System

We have established a new system that alerts residents via phone, text or email about important town issues, starting with the Coronavirus. This is an opt-in system; you can register by phone or by going to the town website and clicking on the <u>CodeRED</u> logo on the bottom of the



home page. To opt in via phone, text the keyword brookfieldct to 99411 and it will prompt you on how to sign up. You can choose how you wish to be notified and can opt out at any time. A number of residents have registered, but we encourage you to if you have not. CodeRED is **not** the Emergency Reverse 911 system used by the Police Department; you will continue to receive notifications from that system.

Gov. Lamont encourages residents to sign up for the state's CT *Alert* notification system

Sign up for CT*Alert*, the state's emergency alert system, which provides text message notifications to **users**. **To subscribe**, **text the keyword COVIDCT to 888-777**.

If you have general questions that are not answered on the website, call 211 to reach a hotline available 24/7, with multilingual assistance and TDD/TTY access. The hotline is for people that have general questions related to COVID-19 – **not** for those experiencing symptoms. If you experience symptoms, you should contact your medical provider.

Housatonic Regional Recycling Authority (HRRA) Poster Contest

The annual Recycling Billboard Contest is facilitated by the Housatonic Resources Recovery Authority, the regional governmental solid waste and recycling authority for Brookfield. More than 2,000 students in grades K-12 from all 11 HRRA member towns participated this year, with 49 regional winners, including 10 from Brookfield. First, second and third place winners were chosen from every grade, in addition to a number of honorable mentions.

This year's theme was about recycling glass separate from the mixed recycling stream. Students were asked to research and understand the importance of recycling glass, and why collecting it separately is more sustainable than mixing it with other items. They used that knowledge to create a recycling billboard ad.



Schools

For a second year in a row, Brookfield High School is nationally ranked by US News & World Report! The magazine's Best High Schools rankings, which include data on more than 24,000 public high schools nationwide, ranks Brookfield 1,519. Nearly 18,000 schools were ranked on six factors based on their performance on state assessments and how well they prepare students for college. Brookfield has steadily improved its state ranking, moving up from 38 in 2019 to 31 this year. Congratulations BHS!

The district's response to the COVID-19 pandemic and the transition to distance learning has been extremely positive. Dr. Barile thanked the community, Board, administration, teachers, and staff for all their efforts at the April Board of Education meeting. Dr. Ruby has sought feedback from BHS students about how they are adjusting to distance learning, via video interviews. The students were positive and complementary to their teachers and provided great feedback to share with faculty and staff. All of the principals continue to seek feedback from faculty and families regarding enhancement opportunities for the Distance Learning Plan.
